What a Great Time for Floral Park

This year's Home & Garden Tour was the best one yet. Homes or gardens were represented on every street south of Santa Clara. We also had a great car show, interesting vendors, good food, and large crowds. The tally is not yet complete as I write this column, but it appears we set a new net income record this year. That money will provide Floral Park with the ability to do great things for itself and for the larger Santa Ana community. It is a time to celebrate!

Plus, the neighborhood just looks great. Darlene and the Beautification Committee touched up the black paint on the streetlights and sign poles south of Santa Clara, placed new flowers at the entrances, and cleaned up and refurbished the entrance monuments. Folks continue to dress up and spruce up their homes. The City continues to do what it can to keep the trees and streetlights up-with promises of more to come.

People seem to be smiling just a little bit more. Ain't that terrific?

Who is Minding the Store?

Have you wondered who controls the association's money? Who decides what the association does? What discretionary spending authority individual board members have? In other words, who is keeping an eye on our assets?

Article III of the Floral Park bylaws is clear:

"No individual or group shall be authorized to commit FPNA to any agreement or obligation without the specific approval of the FPNA Board Members".

This means that all spending decisions, contracts for services, major initiatives, agreements with the City, and payments to third parties must be approved by a majority vote of the board. If an unanticipated expenditure occurs outside of the normal budgeting process, then that expenditure is subject to pre-approval by a majority of the board. Even the monetary decisions of the board are subject to further review and authorization by the general membership.

Floral Park's budget is approved annually at a general membership meeting. Late in 2013, for instance, the proposed budget will be provided well in advance of the

meeting so that all 600 households will have a chance to look at what is proposed so they can be prepared to comment, support, or oppose it at the general membership meeting. If a spending issue arises after the budget has been approved, then that item is brought to a general membership meeting.

Board members or volunteers running projects request payment through invoices that are presented to the treasurer. All checks are normally signed by the treasurer. On rare occasions the board president signs checks during the treasurer's absence. All checks greater than \$1000 are signed by both the board treasurer and the board president. All checks are publicly reported after the fact at the next scheduled board meeting. All board business and minutes are publicly available to the residents of the neighborhood.

All board meetings are open to the neighborhood and households are encouraged to attend and observe. All issues move through the board and they usually take two or three months to be thoroughly discussed and understood before the board acts. While the meetings are deliberative in nature and managed according to Robert's Rules of Order, comment by non-board members desiring to do so is always allowed at some point during the deliberation of every agenda item.

These checks and balances guarantee that several sets of eyes look at an expenditure or a project several times from its initial proposal to execution to after-the-fact review.

Hooray for Floral Park's 2013 Neighborhood Hero Nominee: Sandy DeAngelis

Every year, Santa Ana's Communication Linkage Forum asks all 64 neighborhood associations to propose nominees for the city-wide Neighborhood Hero Award. Up to 15 nominees from around the City are selected to receive the award.

This year through an e-mail blast to the neighborhood, the board asked for candidates. Sandy was nominated from a field of six that was suggested by residents like you.

Sandy was part of the group that originally formed the Floral Park Neighborhood Association and its board of directors. She was also the driving force behind the first Home & Garden Tour. She has served continuously on the board for 22 years and has chaired the Home & Garden Tour for 21 years. She has been a driving force for Floral Park achieving the reputation and respect it so much



the Social Committee is planning a repeat of the event early next year.










So, we all have our favorite eateries, but it's interesting how different needs call for different solutions.

Take, for example, the dilemma of going to dinner before a live performance such as South Coast Rep (SCR) in Costa Mesa. Since the

plays begin at 8, we always ponder whether to go a bit more elegant and languorous or just make it quick and easy. We've tried both. Neither works perfectly.

Do you have that memorable evening out with both excellent fine dining as well as stimulating drama? Or, do you focus on one or the other?

At the two most recent performances of SCR, Sandy, Susan Hart and I have gone the upmarket route to mixed success because, as with an airline reservation, there's always that nagging anxiety that you'll be late. We seem to have come to the conclusion that hurrying is counterproductive.

AnQi, a fantastic Vietnamese restaurant in South Coast Plaza next to Bloomingdale's and behind Charlie Parker's restaurant, certainly fills the bill for upmarket. It ain't cheap! But, I can't say we didn't get our money's worth. It is absolutely fabulous. The décor is just breathtaking, the service impeccable, and the food divine. It's a place that one needs to take in as the evening's entertainment. It is performance eating. So, why hurry perfection?

But we did. To our chagrin, really.

If you'd like to get a feel for the elegance and grace of AnQi, go to www.anqibistro.com. It, too, is a work of art.

OK, so being a stubborn bunch, we thought we'd try it again. And, a month or two later we visited Il Barone, just across the airport runway from SCR. I had great reviews from friends. We were able to squeeze in a 6:30 reservation on the same day as the play. I should have known better, but nooooooo.

Tucked away in a mélange of businesses to include real estate agencies, brokers, hair salons, and other restaurants, Il Barone is not imposing. Being a foodie, I think of its closest landmark being Tapas, obviously a Spanish place, that's been there for years.

Again, that time squeeze. We sat down and immediately told the waiter we'd need to leave by 7:30 or so. That just

put us in the mood of anxiety. Would the food arrive, would we finish in time, what do we do if we're late?

Now, this was a fine meal, but we all came away less than satisfied. I think the lesson learned was, don't do this anymore.

So, our new/old solution for pre-theatre dining is to return to our two old standbys, Thasos Island Grille, a Greek place, and Tandoori India Cuisine, in the shopping center at 3940 Bristol on the corner with Sunflower, just east and across the parking lot of Red Robin. Both have great food at reasonable cost. They're geared to get you in and out with good service and not so much fuss and bother.

At Thasos Island Grille you can get your standard Greek fix – spanakopita, excellent soups, Greek salads, pita bundles, souvlaki, moussaka, and lamb stew. Of course, there are always delicious daily specials that uniformly please the palate. It's nice and easy, making for a wonderful comforting, dining experience without a lot of fuss and muss. Make it a "pita" stop next time you're down that way.

Tandoor India Cuisine is an inviting little establishment, just a few doors from Thasos Island Grille. The staff is friendly and the variety on the menu is pretty amazing. In case you don't know, a tandoori is a cylindrical clay oven used in Indian cooking and thus giving rise to a style of cuisine. While we may or may not find a clay tandoori at this restaurant, the food certainly doesn't show it. It's doggone good for the price. I must say that Indian food continues to surprise and tantalize me. It is right there with French, Italian and Chinese in my book.

Reviewing the menu online as I just did I was once again struck with the fact that there must be a dozen options each among tandoori, chicken, and lamb entrees as well as perhaps two dozen vegetarian choices. Indians are often vegetarians and this type of food is an excellent option for non-meat eaters.

But, for ease and comfort, this is a marvelous pretheater dining opportunity.

So, lesson learned. Let fine dining be fine dining and fine theater be fine theater, perhaps with a little quick and easy as a precursor.

Charities

Good Eats at Puerto Madero Market

Tucked inside an unassuming blue stucco building

Argentine market and deli that serves some of the best sandwiches around. Led there by a very positive review from the OC Register a few years back, we found a neighborhood gem with a very casual atmosphere and friendly service. My introduction was via the choripan, essentially a sausage sandwich, but one that takes it to a new level with beef sausage, chimichurri sauce, and a roll of soft white bread with just enough crunch in the crust to hold it all together.

My favorite sandwich is the chivito. It is made with the same bread, but seems to contain a little bit of everything: a slice of steak, ham, bacon, red bell pepper, tomato and lettuce, and all in the right proportion. Pair it up with an Inca Cola, and you have yourself a very hearty meal. Prefer hand pies? Puerto Madero has you covered with empanadas filled with beef, chicken, ham and cheese, tuna, or

spinach. You can get them fresh from the oven or frozen to cook up at home. If you need a take-out lunch or dinner, call in advance and they will have your sandwiches and empanadas ready for you to take to your home or office.

Talking about deli is only half the story, however. While the market offers products from Argentina, Columbia, and other points south, the meat and deli case have become my go-to for beef, chicken, and deli meats. You can find everything you need for a charcuterie platter, including olives. Prefer grass fed beef over corn? Puerto Madero is closest place around to source it. They have some of the best looking ox tail and short ribs I have seen. Not sure what you want? Angel, the butcher, is there to answer your questions. They even offer "variety meats," if that's your thing.





The City of Santa Ana has a "mySantaAna" Smart Phone application that allows residents with iPhones and Android phone to point, click and send photos of maintenance issues such as graffiti, illegal dumping, potholes, sidewalk defects, street signs, street sweeping, trees, street light repair, weeds, storm drain, water pollution, hazardous waste, animal services, shopping cart removal and transient debris.

iPhone and Android users may download the "mySantaAna" application for free from the iPhone App Store and



Google Play Android Market by searching for the keyword "mySantaAna". Once installed, users will simply open the application and follow the prompts to take pictures of the issue and then tap "submit". Using built-in global positioning system technology, "mySantaAna" will attach a location to the picture and route the information to the appropriate City department for resolution.

City staff and Vendors will now be able to respond like a business, using better technology, encouraging efficiency and faster response times.
